Pastor's Pen

Dear Friends in Christ,

February is often called the month of love, and as we journey through it together, we are reminded of the profound words of 1 Corinthians 13: "Love is patient, love is kind... it does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful... Love never ends." It is fitting these are the words appointed as our epistle reading for the first Sunday of February. Even though these verses are often read at weddings, the apostle Paul wasn't just talking about romantic love. He was speaking of the kind of love that shapes Christian community—the love that reflects God's own heart.

This month, as Valentine's Day approaches, love is celebrated in many ways. But as followers of Jesus, we are called to a love that goes deeper than sentiment. Christian love is a commitment to seeing and honoring the image of God in all people. It is a love that forgives, that seeks justice, that builds bridges where there is division. That's what love looks like in the body of Christ. It's not just about warm feelings—it's about choosing patience when we're frustrated, kindness when we could be critical, and humility when we'd rather be right. It's the love that Jesus showed us, the love that transforms lives.

Love, as Paul describes it, is not passive—it actively seeks the good of others. This month calls us to love in action. Love that listens, learns, and works for justice. Love that acknowledges pain and celebrates resilience. And so, it is also fitting that Paul's words on love also bring us into Black History Month, a time to reflect on the struggles and contributions of Black

Americans and to recommit ourselves to the work of justice. Jesus' love was always on the side of the marginalized he saw those whom others ignored. spoke up for those who had been silenced, and lifted up those who had been cast down. If our love is to be Christ-like, it must be active, inclusive, and deeply rooted in justice and truth. So, as we move into this new month, let's ask ourselves: How are we showing love? Not just to family and friends, but to neighbors, to those who are struggling, to those we may disagree with? Love, Paul tells us, is the greatest gift we can give. And in a world that often feels divided, our love-rooted in Jesus—can be a light.

You are deeply loved, just as you are. And you are called to share that love in ways big and small. May we be a church that serves and speaks boldly, forgives freely, and lifts one another up all in love.
